Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center News:

After over 30 years Merle Hash has retired as director of the Eyeglass Recycling Center and as administrator of the Lions Sight Foundation of Virginia, Inc. Lion Gary Wagner (Cave Spring Lions Club) has been chosen to fill these positions. Lion Gary wanted all clubs to know that we still need volunteers to assist at the Recycling Center. We are often told that when we try to get a group to come down, we can only get two or three Lions to volunteer." That is NOT A PROBLEM. We have several individual Lions that come down to volunteer. We can use one person, two, three or a whole group. The winter weather really put us behind this year. Thanks to the clubs in West Virginia, the recycling center received this week alone over 35,000 pairs of glasses. Adding that to what we already had on hand we now have over 150,000 pairs of eyeglasses needed to be washed (we have 3 dishwashers that need to be filled and emptied), read, bagged and sorted. We are already getting in several requests from missionaries and optometrists to support their work all over the world for this summer. Since January alone we have furnished recycled eyeglasses to India, Haiti, Nicaragua, Honduras, The Dominion Republic, Belize, Mozambique (Africa), Costa Rica and Guatemala. The Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Roanoke is highly rated all over the east coast because of the job that Merle has done over the years. We want to keep it that way. Please support your Eyeglass Recycling Center by volunteering as an individual or as a group.



Information for RAM Housing at UVa-Wise 2015 Thursday, July 16 - Sunday, July 19

To the more than 700 RAM volunteers -- welcome to the UVa-Wise campus!

Please read the information below carefully which is specifically for those RAM volunteers using UVa-Wise Conferences & Events. All RAM housing fees must be paid when returning the contract/reservation form.

COLLEGE RESPONSIBILITIES

The College will provide campus housing and other facilities as stated in the contract. The College assumes no responsibility for accidents and/or lost or stolen property incurred by users or group members. The user further agrees to hold the College harmless from any and all suits or claims resulting from the activities of the user and the participants.

UVa-Wise reserves the right to enter any room for purposes of inspection, policy enforcement, maintenance or emergencies. UVa-Wise may also remove disruptive group members from College residential facilities. No refunds will be provided.

INDIVIDUAL/GROUP RESPONSIBILITIES

The individual/sponsoring group leader(s) assumes full responsibility for the actions of the group members using College facilities and is financially responsible for any and all damages to facilities during the group's stay, including loss of keys, phones, equipment, etc. Groups are expected to abide by all federal, state and local laws and ordinances which may now or hereafter be enacted during the contract period. Groups are also expected to comply with rules and regulations relating to College housing as set forth in the Student Handbook which is available on-line at www.uvawise.edu.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR STAY

CHECK-IN INFORMATION All RAM volunteers must check in at the C. Bascom Slemp Student Center at the 3rd floor Check Desk. Designated check-in dates and times are: Thursday, July 16 – 2 pm-midnight; Friday, July 17 – 7 am-9 pm; and Saturday, July 18 – 2-6 pm.

CHECK-OUT INFORMATION All RAM volunteers must check out at the C. Bascom Slemp Student Center check desk, located on the 3rd floor, during any of the following times: Friday, July 17 – 7 am-9 pm; Saturday, July 18 – 2-6 pm; or Sunday, July 19 – 5-7 am. You must physically return the key to a member of the Conferences & Events staff at the check desk. Leaving your key in the room will result in an improper check-out fee. Failure of groups to check-out during designated times affects facility cleaning schedules and other group check-in times, and thus will result in an improper check-out charge of \$100.00.

COLLEGE PROPERTY/FURNITURE Conference participants must treat College property, furniture, and facilities in an appropriate manner to insure no damage occurs during the group's stay on campus. Individuals/groups will be charged for any resulting damages and/or for any furniture that has been changed, moved and/or removed from campus facilities, including residence hall rooms or common areas.

HOUSEKEEPING The College's Housekeeping staff cleans and prepares individual rooms prior to the arrival of each conference group. All other necessary cleaning and trash removal during your stay must be done by individuals; trash bags are provided in each room. All trash must be taken to the assigned residence hall's dumpsters. Please do not place trash in the hallways; there is no building trash pick-up. A \$25 housekeeping fee will be incurred for trash not removed. *NOTE: We thank you in advance for your complete trash removal as this assists with room preparations for the three high school camps checking in at 11 am after your early morning departure.*

LOST/NON-RETURNED KEYS There will be a room re-keying fee of \$75.00 per lost or non-returned key. Please immediately see a member of the Conferences & Events staff for assistance with lost keys during your stay. Keys must be returned upon check-out to the SSC 3rd floor Check Desk, or applicable fees will be billed to the responsible individual/group. NOTE: 'Found' keys mailed/returned after 7 am on Sunday, July 19, do not negate the room re-keying charge(s) as rooms are re-keyed immediately after a group's departure in anticipation of the next group's arrival.

PARKING All guests must park in a legitimate parking place in one of the following lots — Culbertson Hall Gravel Lot, McCraray Hall Gravel Lot, Asbury Hall lot, and Martha Randolph Hall lot. Parking tickets may be issued to RAM participants who park on sidewalks, in the road, or in front of the buildings. *Note: McCraray Hall is reserved for faculty/staff parking and is not available to RAM participants during regular business hours; however, it is available throughout the weekend beginning after 5 pm on Friday.* Additional parking to groups is available at Greear Gymnasium.

PAYMENT INFORMATION Payment by check (made payable to UVa-Wise Conferences & Events) must be submitted when returning the contract/reservation form. Room assignments will not be processed until payment has been received. Refunds requested in writing or by email by July 1 will be processed. No refunds will be given after July 1, If a reservation holder is unable to attend, a same sex substitution of a new participant can be made. Any additional charges incurred during RAM weekend will be billed to individuals/groups. If you need to pay be credit card, you need to submit the form and call the Conference & Events Office at 276-376-1000.

POLICIES ON ALCOHOL, SMOKING/TOBACCO USAGE & WEAPONS/FIREARMS

ALCOHOL The College abides by all state laws and regulations regarding alcohol usage and consumption. <u>Alcohol consumed by those of legal drinking age must be confined to personal rooms and is not permitted in common areas and general use spaces including balconies, lounges, hallways, etc.</u> Those who do not abide by these stipulations will be subject to ticketing and/or arrest.

SMOKING/TOBACCO All campus buildings are tobacco-free (including smoking and smokeless tobaccos). Use of all tobacco products is prohibited in all College facilities, including seating areas/stands of outdoor athletic facilities, as well as within 25 feet of the entrance of any College indoor/outdoor facility. If you smoke, please discard all cigarette butts in appropriate containers. Throwing them on the ground is considered littering. Receptacles are placed near facilities for the collection of waste tobacco products.

WEAPONS/FIREARMS The University of Virginia's College at Wise provides rules and regulations concerning the possession of weapons on college owned property and all facilities in an effort to provide a safe and secure learning and working environment for the students, faculty, staff and visitors in accordance with the University of Virginia Policy: Regulation of Weapons, Fireworks and Explosives, available at https://policy.itc.virginia.edu/policy/policydisplay?id=SEC-030. No student, faculty, staff, visitor or affiliate shall carry, possess, maintain, or conceal (concealed handgun carry permits included) on any property owned by The University of Virginia's College at Wise.

PORCHES, BALCONIES AND ROOFS Porches and balconies must be kept clean and clear. No furniture or chairs may be left outside. Clothing, towels, etc. may not be hung from porches, railings or any other outside areas. ALL BUILDING ROOFS ARE OFF-LIMITS.

QUIET HOURS/NOISE To insure the comfort of all our groups, courtesy quiet hours are in effect from 10 pm each night until 8 am the following morning. We ask that all group members please be considerate of others for any noise(s) that may carry outside of individual rooms/suites. Most College offices maintain year-round office hours each weekday, so please also be considerate of them for your daytime event or as your residential group travels to/from practice fields, classrooms, residence halls, etc.


RESIDENCE HALLS The following halls will be available for your stay during RAM weekend:



ASBURY HALL These two and three bedroom apartments are hardwired for internet access. They are furnished with beds, wardrobes, chests, desks w/chairs, and blinds. Each apartment has one full bath and one half bath, furnished living room, small table and chairs, and a full kitchen.



McCRARAY HALL This residence hall with double occupancy rooms is hard-wired for internet access. Each floor has a common bathroom. Male and female residents live on separate wings of the building. Rooms are furnished with beds, closets, chests, desks w/chairs, and blinds. Built-in desk lamps are furnished on the women's wing.



MARTHA RANDOLPH HALL This suite-area residential facility is airconditioned. Each unit is hardwired for internet access. These two-bedroom units are furnished with beds, chests, desks w/chairs, closets, and blinds. These units have a bathroom and a common area with sofa, coffee table, end tables, and love seat.

RESPECT TO COLLEGE PERSONNEL All conference groups and their members must be respectful to Conferences & Events staff members, as well as other members of the College community. Conferences & Events staff members are to insure that groups maintain College policies, procedures and safety standards, and thus, when necessary, will make requests in accordance with the enforcement of stated policies in a courteous and respectful manner. Groups should also be reminded that campus offices remain open throughout the summer and should be reminded to be considerate as they travel from facility to facility.

But to visually impaired kids, the eggs are a chance to hunt Easter eggs on their own! You should hear the noise a hundred eggs make on the soccer field at the Smith River Sports Complex in Axton VA! The kids love it!





"No more getting only a few eggs compared to my cousin's dozens," says Lion Lori Floyd from her childhood experience. Floyd, who is visually impaired herself, started the event in Southside Virginia. She first saw the idea for a beeping hunt during an event in Virginia Beach. Henry County Sheriff's deputy Brian Punturi, Virginia State Police Bomb Technician, Bill O'Dell, and Bill Floyd built the eggs with parts donated by the International Association of Bomb Technicians and Investigators.

Lion Eddie Fields was amazed when he learned about the event and couldn't wait to get involved. With donations and volunteers from the Martinsville/Henry County Lions Club, the Smith Mountain Lake Lions Club, and the Danville Host Lions Club, the event has grown bigger every year.

These clubs along with many other

donors and volunteers have, according to Dawn Peifer, president of the Virginia Association of Parents of Children with Visual Impairments, given children with visual impairments "the extraordinary opportunity to be ordinary."

So, congratulations to everyone for making an egg hunt "ordinary" for so many kids!

On March 24 Giles Breakfast Lions used our SPOT unit to screen the vision of the children at the two county Head Start schools. A total of 43 children were screened with only two needing referrals to an eye care professional. One parent was screened at the Narrow school. He was referred to the Narrows Lions Club for vision testing with the Optometrist they use. At the Pearisburg school we also screened one parent and six staff members. One staff member was referred for a full eye exam.

Tina Moumau, Lions Charlie Herbert and Dave Zai set up SPOT vision screening prior to vision screening at the Narrows Head Start School on March 24.

Roanoke Valley Breakfast Club

Lion Jerry Hardesty, eyeglass recycling guru and one of the hardest working Lions around, responded to the District's call to help alleviate the huge backlog of eyeglasses to be recycled. The backlog was caused by recycling sessions missed during the snowy weather in February. Lion Jerry coordinated a change in the usual 6 PM to 8 PM recycling session to 2:30 until 8 PM. Hundreds of glasses were recycled by 18 of our Lions giving the prescription reading machines a real workout. Lion Jerry has coordinated eyeglass recycling for the past 20 years.



When asked why he volunteered for this assignment, he simply responded "I wear glasses".



In 2015, the list of wonderful experiences one enjoys by being a member of the RVBLC expanded to include "romantic love." Lions Jim and Wanda Dalton sponsored Lions Ernie Hubble and Mary Jo Hall because they believed that they would make great Lions. They certainly have proven them correct in that regard. Prior to joining RVBLC, Lions Ernie and Mary Jo had not seen each other in roughly 30 years. They became reacquainted through volunteering together recycling eyeglasses and conducting vision screenings. Through their service to others, they discovered that they enjoy spending time together. Lions Ernie and Mary Jo were married on Valentine's Day 2015.



RVBLC has assisted with preparing and serving breakfast to hundreds of homeless women and children since 2003. On the 3rd Saturday of the month, members volunteer at the Rescue Mission from 5:45 am to 8 am, missing only one day due to dangerous road conditions. An average of 6 to 10 Lions sign up each month and perform whatever tasks are

needed, such as making sandwiches for bag lunches, cleaning tables, and assisting with food preparation - slicing, dicing,

chopping, peeling, and even cutting up whole chickens. During the past 12 years, RVBLC has volunteered 144 Saturdays; over 2,268 hours. The Rescue Mission recognized our efforts by awarding us with the Volunteer of the Year Award in 2008. Lion Mary Ann DeMars serves as our coordinator for this project.





Responding to a need in our community, Lions Cliff and Mary Ann DeMars introduced and coordinated the "Soup for Senior's Project" for Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club. The RVBLC donated 151 cans of soup, 34 boxes of crackers, and \$6 for other items needed to support the well being of senior citizens in our community. In addition to the food and monetary donations, our club provided 10 volunteers to assist with the packaging and distribution of food.

Lion Ellen Coleman has a proven track record of sales. She does not mind asking neighbors, family and friends to contribute or purchase items in support of a good cause. She values the work of Lions and works diligently to support all of her clubs activities. Since she has already sold 16 books, everyone knows who will lead the way in LOVF ticket sales again this year. Last year, she sold one of the winning tickets and won \$100. Lion Ellen is a real treasure to the RVBLC.





Lion Bill Craft is definitely a man ahead of his times. The now 83-year-old courageously integrated the Lions Clubs in the state of Virginia when he chartered the Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club in 1977. His service with Lewis Peery in the Boys Scouts led to the development of a strong friendship and a recognition that they shared a common bond, a desire and commitment to serve their community.

Lion Bill recognized that their similarity was stronger and deeper than their visible differences. Through their vast social connections, they identified a group of diverse men who shared their passion for community service and established the Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club which was inaugurated on May 4, 1977.

Lion Bill's response to questions about his motivation for organizing an integrated Lions Club speaks to his character and his compassion for others. He stated "One thing was a hidden thing. The Blacks in this community had not many of the same opportunities that I had, and that had concerned me for a long time." He was not sure how his awareness of and concern about the disparity in the treatment of the races developed but he speculated that it might be related to his service in the U.S. Marine Corps. He became a Marine in 1952, 10 years after President Franklin Roosevelt, in response to pressure from Black civil rights leaders, signed Executive Order 8802 to allow Blacks to serve in the U.S. Marine Corps. Thus, his active and reserve tenure in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1952 through 1960 provided him with visible lessons in racial inequality. Bill obviously did not accept the status quo. He had a burning desire to be inclusive of all people, to help foster a community where everyone was treated with dignity and respect. Bill said that what others saw as problems, he saw as challenges, just hurdles to get around. He said "I do not allow any child of the Lord to tell me what I can or cannot do." This type of attitude and leadership earned Lion Bill many accolades and recognitions, including being recognized by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, for his assistance in establishing the Downtown DC Anacostia Youth Project. Robert Cree, a member of his scouting staff in the late 50's, reflecting on his observation of Bill stated "In all situations, Bill treated all kids the same irrespective of their race."

Professionally, Bill was an administrator with Boys Scouts of America, United Way, and American Red Cross. He was introduced to Lionism when he was invited to join the Williamson Road Lions Club. As he relocated to other places because of his career, he maintained membership in a service club, either the Lions or Kiwanis. When he returned to Roanoke in 1977, he gave birth to the Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club, the first Club in the State to include Black members and the first breakfast Lions Club in Roanoke. The Club, with a current membership of 45, will celebrate its 38th year on June 12, 2015.



A native of Roanoke, Lion Bill graduated from William Fleming High School in 1950. He is the proud father and grandfather of three children, six grandchildren, and 11 great grandchildren. He currently resides at "Our Lady of the Valley" and enjoys visits from his family and friends.
