November 4, 2008 – Election Day

Everyone should exercise their right to VOTE. I hope you will take to this opportunity to get out and assist in electing the officials who run our local, state, and federal governments.

Election of Vice District Governor

On October 13, the Cabinet met to elect a replacement for Vice District Governor Joe Gwinn who is retiring at the end of October. He and Lion Bettye are moving to Florida where they have purchased a home. I owe a real debt of gratitude to both Lions Joe and Bettye for their assistance over the last few months.

The Cabinet selected PDG Lion Donald Rhinehart as Lion Joe's replacement. We submitted the necessary documents to LCI for their consideration and appointment of Lion Don as our Vice District Governor for Lions Year 2009. Lion Don's approval has been received.

Succession Planning LY 2010 and Beyond

We have had a problem over the last few years of not having

Lions ready to succeed the out going Vice District Governor. As we move into the next few years, we will have to become used to having two Vice District Governors.

In order to plan for the expanding need for this position, I am proposing to have a Succession Committee impaneled to address the issues related to the positions of District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, and 2nd Vice District Governor.

Many problems are created by not having Lions ready to fill these extremely important positions. Did you know that PID Lion Richard cannot run for 2nd Vice President of LCI because we have fewer than 1,250 members? We must not only have 1,250 members but we have to have 35 clubs before anyone can run for VP of LCI.

I believe our decreased membership is directly related to the lack of active leadership in our District. As I have attended the various Fall Conferences, I see how supportive various Districts are of their District Governors. We need to return to this high level to ensure we are not MERGED with another District. You and I must increase our level of activity and support of the various committees and projects we have in District 24E.

I do not want to be MERGED with any other District, DO YOU? If you do, please call me and let us discuss what happens if we are so unfortunate to have this happen to our District!

Virginia Tobacco Settlement Fund Application

In the past six weeks a number of us have been working on two grant proposals that we submitted to the Virginia Tobacco Settlement Fund Office. Lions Gloria Guice, Ron Robey, Dallas Scott, and others have worked hard on the proposals that could bring \$450,000 to our District for Lions Quest.

The grants involve Bedford County Schools and City of Roanoke Schools. I want to thank these school system executives for their support and cooperation in completing these applications. Lion Dallas did an outstanding job in getting the applications completed. Lions Gloria, Ron and others did a fantastic job working with the Superintendents' Office coordinating the needed paperwork regarding cooperation between the schools and the Lions.

The way to get things done in the District is through partnerships and cooperation. I appreciate everyone's' efforts to achieve the goals we set for this project.

and what the outcome was.

- 3. Determine funds needed to ensure the successful completion of the project/program. If you do not have the needed funds, determine the best way to raise the funds if this is the direction you want to go. Is there someone in the community you can call on to assist in raising the funds needed?
- 4. Meet with civic, business, and political leaders and involve them in all phases of the project/program you want to undertake. These individuals can provide the support needed to effectively address the community needs. When we work smarter, we can accomplish far greater things.
- 5. Plan the project rarely will a single club or group have all of the expertise needed to address all the needs of a community project/program.. The synergy of the group is far more when we involve the leaders of our area. PARTNERSHIPS are the best way to accomplish our goals and objectives.

Focus on Culture

As I sit and write this newsletter column, signs of the holidays are springing up all around me. Stores not only have Halloween items discounted on their shelves, but Thanksgiving and Christmas decorations too! It seems like the holiday preparations come earlier and earlier each year. What do each of these holidays celebrate? Let's take a look and see.

Chanukah is observed for eight days, beginning on the evening of the twenty fifth day of the month of <u>Kislev</u>. This year, *Chanukah* starts at sundown, Sunday, December 21st, and lasts for eight days thru *Shabbat*, December 29th. It is also known as the Festival of Lights, Feast of Dedication, and Feast of the Maccabees. Hanukkah commemorates the rededication of the Temple of Jerusalem by Judas Maccabee in 165 BC after the Temple had been profaned by Antiochus IV Epiphanes, king of Syria and overlord of Palestine. *Chanukah* is a wonderful holiday of renewed dedication, faith, hope and spiritual light. It's a holiday that says: "Never lose hope."

Christmas is an annual Christian and secular holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus, along with the themes family, goodwill, giving and compassion. Christmas is traditionally celebrated on December 25. It is preceded by Christmas Eve and in some countries is followed by Boxing Day. It incorporates Christian religious ceremonies with the traditions of ancient winter festivals such as Yule. I believe that the meaning of Christmas is different for everyone. For some it means spending the Christmas season with family and friends, remembering the birth of Christ, reliving old traditions, or giving service to those in need. It's a holiday that says: "Love."

Kwanzaa is an African American holiday which celebrates family, community and culture. Celebrated from 26 December thru 1 January, its origins are in the first harvest celebrations of Africa from which it takes its name. Kwanzaa builds on the five fundamental activities of African "first fruit" celebrations: ingathering; reverence; commemoration; recommitment; and celebration. Kwanzaa, then, is: a time of ingathering of the people to reaffirm the bonds between them; a time of special reverence for the creator and creation in thanks and respect for the blessings, bountifulness and beauty of creation; a time for commemoration of the past in pursuit of its lessons and in honor of its models of human excellence; a time of recommitment to cultural ideals in an ongoing effort to always bring forth the best of cultural thought and practice; and a time for celebration of the *Good*, the good of life and of existence itself, the good of family, community and culture, the good of the extraordinary and the ordinary. It's a holiday that says: "Celebrate the good in all around you."

Regardless of which holiday you celebrate, there is much we can learn from all three. Whether you choose Chanukah, Christmas, Kwanzaa or a combination of them all; the upcoming season is a season of belief and wonderment...a season of sharing what's right in this world with others...a season of peace and brotherly love. As you go through this holiday season, my wish for you is this: A world filled with Love...A world that looks for and finds the Good in all around us...and, A world in which we never lose Hope for Peace.


