We are expanding Camp Too Sweet this year to 70 campers from 42 campers last year. We have expanded our membership to almost offset our losses. You have performed more eye exams and bought more glasses than in years past. You are utilizing the Spot machines for eye exams. The homeless were given eye exams in Roanoke. First of all, I want to thank everyone who has supported me on this most recent venture. I am really looking forward to serving our District once again as your District Governor. It has been a pleasure to travel with DG Dallas to a number of clubs and renew acquaintances and meet new Lions throughout the District. There are a number of good Lions in the District with a wealth of knowledge that I can call on. I have never been one to hesitate to ask for help and don't see any reason to start now.

I personally want to thank DG Dallas for his fantastic service these past several years and want him to know that the Lions of Virginia appreciate everything he has done. I also want him to know that it doesn't stop just because his year is over. I will be calling on him for assistance on many occasions this next Lions Year.

I appreciate Lion Kirk Sampson for stepping up and taking the office of First Vice District Governor. I know that Lion Kirk will do a fantastic job as 1VDG and DG just as he has as a Zone Chairperson. Lion Kirk will be training the incoming Zone Chairs some time in June. A date has not been set but will be announced very soon.

Out District is still considered a Transitional District due to our membership being below 1,250 members. We will be working very hard on restoring the District to Regular status. Lion DG Dallas, Lion Charlie Herbert and I spent the last weekend in March at a Strategic Planning Workshop in northern Virginia with representatives of all districts in the state where we went over the strengths and weaknesses of our District and prepared a Plan that hopefully will help bring the District out of Transitional status in the next 3 to 4 years. This plan will be presented to the District Cabinet at their first meeting in July and then we will take it to the individual clubs for their buy in. One of the first things we need to do is stop the "bleeding' of members dropping out of Lionism. We are losing too many experienced, dedicated Lions. I don't believe anyone has the magic answer to this problem, but we can keep trying.

We are looking at forming a Branch Club at Ferrum, a Lions Club at Richfield Retirement Community and building up the membership of the Giles Rich Creek Breakfast Branch Lions Club to make it a Regular Lions Club.

I will be calling on all Lions in District 24-E for your help in accomplishing our goals of serving those who are less fortunate than we. IT IS GREAT TO BE A LION.

Please share the following formal agreement between District 24-E Lions Clubs and the Lions District 24-E Charity, Inc., with your Lions Club Board of Directors and Members.

Deposit/Withdrawal Agreement Lions District 24-E Charity, Inc.

Whereas Lions District 24-E Charity, Inc.(herein the "Corp.") has been formed and has an IRS 501(c)(3) designation as a tax exempt charitable organization, which allows, (1) interest earned on deposits to be non-taxable to the organization and (2) donors to the Corp. to claim such donations as a charitable gift on the donors' federal tax return, and

Whereas most individual Lions' Clubs do not have specific 501(c)(3) designations, which hinders gifts and bequests from donors and estates to those clubs, and

Whereas it is the desire of the Corp. and the _______ Lions Club (herein the" Club"), to allow the Clubs' gifts and bequests to be deposited into the Corp.'s Money Market Account, so that donors may claim their gifts or bequests as a charitable donation for federal tax purposes.

Therefore this agreement sets forth the understandings, stipulations and covenants of the parties as follows:

1. The club will deposit \$______ into the Corp.'s Money Market Account (herein the Fund) as of the date of this agreement.

2. Withdrawals from, or directions to pay from the Clubs' deposit into the Fund must be by written request signed by the Club President and Treasurer.

- 3. All interest earned on the Money Market Account will be apportioned according to the amount deposited by the Club, during the time the Club's deposit remains in the Fund.
- 4. In the event there are more than 6 withdrawals from the Fund in any one month the fee the Fund's bank may charge will be apportioned among all withdrawing clubs.
- 5. All expenses incurred by the Corp., such as the annual fee charged by the Virginia State Corporation Commission and any audits or bookkeeping fees, will be apportioned among the clubs having money in the Fund during the period in which the expense occurred.
- 6. This agreement shall be continuous and ongoing until canceled by one of the parties . Either party may cancel this agreement for any reason upon 30 days written notice to the other, at the address shown below the signature line.






Zone Meeting


