## **Tragedy in Oklahoma**

Dear Lions,

As many of you know, a tragic event occurred in the United States a few days ago. A deadly tornado touched down in the state of Oklahoma killing over 20 people, including children, as well as destroying schools, a hospital and many homes in the town of Moore.

A donor in Vancouver, Canada, was so moved by the stories of individual bravery and survival from Oklahoma that he donated US\$1,000 to the disaster relief fund at Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) as a challenge to other Lions to match his donation. A match does not need to be the full \$1,000, but can be any amount - even US\$1. Through local Lions efforts, this money will be used for immediate relief and long term reconstruction. Many other Lions across the US and world have also responded to the devastation in Oklahoma. A club in Michigan had a club meeting Tuesday night where over US\$3,000 was donated with more on the way from clubs across the district. Districts in Florida and Virginia are sending truckloads of relief supplies to the scene. Donations have come in from Ontario and Prince Edward Island in Canada and from many clubs in the US.

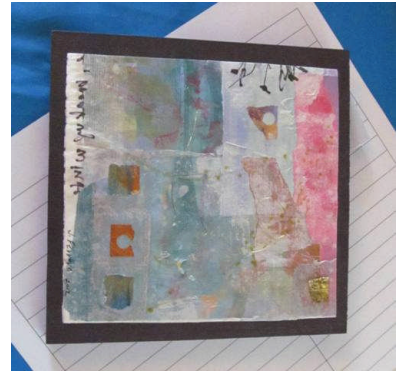
