### Final Message from your District Governor

It has been my great pleasure to serve as your District Governor for 2013-2014. I have truly enjoyed meeting and spending time in fellowship with the Lions across the District. We are doing great work in 24-E!

Serving on the Council of Governors has been both a learning and a rewarding experience. When we had a difference of opinion, by having debate and respecting each others views, we were able to come to agreement and support the decisions of the Council.

Some of the items the Council accomplished were

- 1. Agreeing to submit a bid for the U.S./Canada Forum to be hosted in Virginia Beach in 2018.
- 2. The Council rewrote the criteria for the State Achievement Award, 100% Secretary, 100% Treasurer and Leo Awards.
- 3. In January, the State Budget Committee proposed an assessment of \$4.00 per member to be presented to the delegates at the State. Convention. After much thought and discussion, the Council decided not to put this amendment on the floor and to look for ways to decrease costs starting with the State Budget.

The first step was to move the State Office to the Lions of Virginia Sight Foundation on Elm Street. The Foundation Board has agreed to allow the State Office to occupy their empty offices free of charge in lieu of paying rent in the Cave Spring location.

The next step was to form a committee, composed of one representative from each district, to study other ways to alleviate costs at the state level. The Committee will also work on an updated job description for the State Secretary/Treasurer. The Committee will make recommendations to the new Council at their first meeting in September. PCC and Cabinet Secretary Clark Vandergrift will be District 24-E's representative on this Committee.

4. The Council awarded the next 5 State Conventions to:

2015 24-A Tysons Corner
2016 24-E Hotel Roanoke
2017 24-E Hotel Roanoke (100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary)

2018 24-B Richmond TBA

5. The Council elected to allow the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG's to attend all of the Council Meetings in order to see how the Council functions and to know what has taken place in the present year. It is hoped that this will give them a chance to bond and be better able to work together in their term in office.

In the next issue of The Lions Pride, I will give a more detailed summary of our year, not all the results are in yet. I will also list the Lions and Clubs that were recognized for their outstanding contributions during the year. I want to make these awards personally before they are announced in the "Pride".

I hope my team and I have made a positive impact on the District this year!

The Lions of Virginia (LOV) joined together at their 91<sup>st</sup> Annual State Convention May 15-18 at the Sheraton Premiere Hotel, Tysons Corner, in Vienna, VA. The event was a huge success thanks to Bailey's Crossroads Host Lions Club, especially Lion Harry F. Parker, State Convention Committee General Chairperson, and Lion Rosanne Snider Host Club Chairperson.

The four day event started Thursday afternoon with general registration and verification of credentials, followed with entertainment by The Rockin' Rebels-Fairfax Fame.

Friday featured a full day of activities which included a Spouse/Guest Hospitality Room, District Cabinet Meetings, and various Board Meetings, also the Opening General Session. An Address of Welcome was given by Congressman Gerry Connolly, 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District. The main event of the day was the introduction of

Charles Lytton served as a very capable, if untrained and somewhat unorthodox, auctioneer.


