"Read Across America", the national observance of Dr. Seuss' birthday to promote reading in elementary school, will be celebrated on Monday, March 2, 2015. This is usually observed in grades K-3rd grade.

Service organizations like the Lions, as well as churches, high school clubs, and others participate as readers in their assigned schools.

In the Roanoke Valley (Roanoke City, Roanoke County, Salem City), we have a Regional Director who works with service organization leaders. Each school has a designated coordinator (usually the reading teacher or librarian) who schedules the reading times, grades, locations, and she will also provide reading material if requested. School assignments go from the service leaders to the regional director so we don't have more than one organization at any one school. Many schools are reserved by the same organizations year to year. We have several Lions Clubs that have participated for the last few years, and I will be contacting them again to confirm their participation at their schools. If your Club, or any member of your Club, would like to participate in a Roanoke Valley school, please contact me. Once I have a Club confirmed for a school, I will provide the Club with the name and contact information for that school's coordinator.

We still have some Roanoke Valley elementary schools that have never had outside readers, such as the Vinton schools. So we need more participation from more Lions Clubs to ensure that each school has an outside reader.

Franklin County had a Regional Director last year for the first time. I'm hoping she will continue this year. All Franklin County Lions Clubs participated last year. I will be contacting them again this year for school assignments.

For other areas, most elementary schools participate in "Read Across America". If your Club is already working in a school, ask the principal about participating in "Read Across America" Day. If your Club is not already working in a school, let me know and I will find a school for you in your area.

Giles Breakfast Lions Club was able to put its SPOT vision screening to work at Pembroke United Methodist Church on Sunday, August 24 at their annual Back-to-School event. The churches United Methodist Women group established this event four years ago to enable the very neediest children in Giles County to go back to school with all the proper school supplies they'll need for their specific grade level and school as well as new shoes, clothing, haircuts, dental screening and vision screening. This year they served over 300 children ages Kindergarten – 8th grade.

Club President Charlie Herbert states "We were able to screen over 50 children from the ages of 7 months to 13 years of age. Fortunately only seven of these children were referred to eye care professionals for further evaluation". "Because we have SPOT we were able to screen one child that was only 7 months old and another that was only 10 months old. SPOT allowing us to screen children not yet old enough to read as well as other children who are non-verbal for whatever reason is a huge advancement in Lions vision screening. That's exciting". Although neither of the infants screened had any problems this would have been crucial time to pick up any problems and to have had them treated at this young age.

We thank Lion Joe Straub and his lovely wife Barbara for bringing the Blacksburg Breakfast Lions Spot unit over to give us an assist.



The Community Garden established by Giles Breakfast Lions Club in partnership with Christ Episcopal Church in Pearisburg has been producing very well. 


Moneta Lions Club


