My year as your District Governor is a little over 50% complete. I have made all of my club visits, except for one that was rescheduled due to our recent snow storm. I still plan on visiting our four (4) Leo Clubs.

As you all are aware, my theme for the year is "Growing Lionism", which I selected because of my concern about the declining membership in our District 24-E.

The good news for the first half of the year is that District 24-E was one of only two (2) districts in Virginia with positive membership growth; we were +5. I am optimistic that if we all continue to emphasize and work on membership that we can achieve positive growth for the year.

One of our goals this year was to form at least one (1) new lions club. This goal appears to be very near. The Rich Creek Giles Breakfast Branch Lions Club is scheduled to become an official lions club at their scheduled charter night on Saturday, March 5th.

We are also working on starting a new lions club in the Fincastle/Daleville area. Lion Steve Thornton of Ohio, who is a LCI membership recruitment specialist, will be coming to Roanoke on Sunday, February 7th and will be leading us in membership recruitment in that area from Monday, February 8th through February 11th. We are looking for up to 20 Lion volunteers to assist us with this effort. Redistricting is a "hot topic" right now. District 24-F has suggested that we agree to go ahead and merge 24-E and 24-F now. The current plan is to vote on a redistricting plan at the State Convention on Saturday, May 21st.

Speaking of the State Convention, as you are probably aware, this year and 2017, the State Convention will be held in Roanoke at the Hotel Roanoke. PCC Clark Vandergrift is the State Convention Chair and has been working very hard to bring you the very best 2016 State Convention, which is scheduled for Thursday, May 19th through Saturday, May 21st. I urge all Lions in District 24-E to attend this State Convention, it will never be closer! This is an excellent opportunity to meet Lions from all over Virginia.

RAVE

In celebration of Roanoke Alliance for the Visually Enabled (RAVE), RVBLC is sponsoring a fashion show on April 9, 2016 featuring models from RAVE. Under the leadership of Dianne Decker, founder of RAVE, it is obvious how RAVE continues to be a vital and valuable asset in our community.

One only has to meet Dianne once to know that she is a person who knows how to make things happen. When she spoke to our club last year, she shared that our club is one of the Lions Clubs that has been a supporter of RAVE since its inception. In fact, the club received its name from RVBLC member, Lion JJ Johnson. In a document written by Dianne on the history of Lions involvement with RAVE, she reminisced:

"It did not take long for the group to realize that "The Support Group for Blind/Low Vision Individuals in the Roanoke Area" was a moniker too cumbersome with which to deal, so a contest was



held to find a suitable name, and the entry submitted by Lion J. J. was unquestionably the winner. He explained that while on an errand for his wife to purchase a bottle of RAVE hair spray, he looked at the label and thought: "Roanoke-Alliance for the Visually"-- but was temporarily stumped until he came up with the "e" word, "Enabled!" Enabled was the word that most appealed to the group because of its positive connotation. It was not "disabled" or "handicapped," but rather "Enabled" a very empowering word. Thus, the group became known as the Roanoke Alliance for the Visually Enabled or RAVE. Even the acronym RAVE means to laud or praise-the kind of positive message the group tries to project. Lion J. J. has faithfully continued to drive for RAVE since day one. Even when a new employment opportunity came his way

which required evening hours, he made arrangements with his new employer to be off from work part of the day on Wednesdays, so he could continue to drive for RAVE.

Lion Alan Guyes coordinates drivers for RAVE for our club. He is another Lion who has served as a driver for RAVE since its beginning. Lion Alan stated that projects like this are the reason he opt to become a lion three decades ago. Dianne Becker shared the following observation about Alan: "Even as the busy business owner of Audiotronics, he very rarely has to ask others to substitute for him. On one rare occasion, however, he even drew upon the generosity of his wife, Deborah, to transport his riders to the annual RAVE Christmas Dinner."





Lions Karl Saliba (left) and Glenn Asher have also been drivers for RAVE for several years. Lion Alan shared that he and Lion Karl became drivers from day one of the support group, while they were members of the Tanglewood Breakfast Lions Club. After that club folded, they joined RVBLC and continued to serve as drivers for RAVE.

Lion Glenn Asher has a special sensitivity to persons who are blind. His father was blind. When his father moved to Roanoke, he brought his father to RAVE meetings. He and his mother continued to be ardent supporters of RAVE after the death of his father. In fact, Dianne shared that his mother, although sighted, held an office in the club as the "Sunshine Lady," sending birthday and get well greetings to members. There are several other members of RVBLC who drive for RAVE as the need occurs.

Dianne is grateful for the support of the many Lions who support RAVE with drivers and financially. She is especially appreciative of her husband of 21 years, Lion Dick Decker, a 31-year member of CAVE Spring Lions Club, who was District Sight Chairman at the time she presented her proposal requesting assistance from Lions with transportation. Upon his recommendation and under the leadership of Area 24 E District Governor, Don Rhineheart, Roanoke area Lions Club adopted RAVE as a project.



Because of Lions, RAVE has been able to aid countless men and women and their families to adjust to the life changes that vision loss has brought into their lives. RAVE recognizes that the primary reason for its success has been the ability to provide transportation to its meetings. As a result, the Virginia Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired has scheduled its annual Public Hearings for the Roanoke Area in conjunction with RAVE's October meetings. They have done so for 22 years because, thanks to Lions, the Roanoke meetings are the best attended in the Commonwealth. This has been possible because of the commitment and support from the Cave Spring Lions Club, the Edgewood Lions Club, the Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club, the Roanoke Host Lions Club, and the Salem Host Lions Club who have consistently provided drivers for RAVE. RAVE meets every 3rd Wednesday from 7 to 8:30 pm in the Lions Sight Foundation Building on the corner of Elm Avenue and 5th Street.

Special Needs

Early in December I received a call from a 38 year old woman from New Castle, VA., Clarisa Shepherd. This young woman is totally blind in her right eye and has only very limited vision in her left eye. What she does have in the left eye is complicated by tunnel vision. She has telescopic attachments she can add to her glasses but this does not allow her to read.

Clarisa's vision specialist, Dr. David Armstrong of Roanoke, had suggested a table top magnifier that he'd been shown by a sales rep. Through a deal with that sales rep he had purchased her demo magnifier. Clarisa had tried the magnifier in his office with good results. He offered it to us, along with a 22" TV to go with it for what he'd paid the sales rep. - \$ 825.00. The unit retails for between \$1600.00 and \$1700.00.

On Monday, December 21st we met Clarisa at Dr. Armstrong's office. The doctor spent 30-45 minutes showing her how to set up and use the magnifier. It consists of a tray on which she can lay whatever she wants to read and a camera she can move over it. The camera projects the images onto the TV screen. There are adjustments on the camera to magnify the images to whatever size print she needs to be able to read with as much ease as she can.

I can't say that I've seen anyone so excited or appreciative of this gift to enable her to be able to read again. Such a simple thing to most of us but such an unlikely thing to this young woman until she was able to sit down with this wonderful technology. Thanks to the generosity of Lions in District 24E this young woman was given a new lease on life and a Very Merry Christmas.



A few weeks after we met Clarisa I received the following thank you:

Thank you so very much for purchasing the desktop magnifier for me. That was such an awesome thing for your all to do. I am so humbled that you would do that. I almost didn't ask for help because I thought that someone else might be in more need. I prayed and felt that God wanted me to have it. So I sought help. You answered that call. And for that I am thankful. This is such a blessing. One that I will not take for granted. I pray that you can bless other people just like myself and other that are less fortunate. On Thursday, January 28, I received a check for \$140 from District 24E to purchase the shoes for Donna Perdue of Blacksburg.

Each time a call comes in for assistance I do my best to make sure the request is valid and that we can assist in fulfilling the request. That takes money. We currently have \$5000 in our budget. To Our House Ministry, a program sponsored by large churches throughout the New River Valley, serves the homeless men of the area. Women and children have shelters to which they can turn but there is no shelter for the homeless male population. Beginning in November and carrying through until April these churches rotate hosting a group of homeless men offering them a place to be out of the cold, have shower facilities, hot, freshly prepared meals and a warm bed to sleep in.

Pembroke United Methodist Church, where Giles Breakfast Lions meet, hosts these gentlemen for a two week period in January. On the morning of our monthly meeting members prepare and serve a hot, nutritious breakfast for the men. The club began this partnership with the church in the first year we met there in January 2011. After the men have eaten the club meets and shares a breakfast together. This year the club moved its regular meeting schedule one week so that they could accommodate the church's schedule.





At this January meeting the club was joined by 1st VDG Marty Alford who inducted our newest member into the club. Sonu Chawla. Originally from India, Sonu and her husband Micky now make their home in Pearisburg. With Sonu's induction club membership has increased by 5 since December 1, 2015. Lion Sonu was sponsored by her neighbor Lion Al Katz. Lion Sonu brings the club's total membership to 17.

Also at this meeting the club was joined by Melanie Hart from the Smart Beginnings program. This program targets at risk pre- school children. It is estimated that the "Word Gap" between children of professional parents and those who live in under privileged homes is 300,000. Which puts them at a distinct disadvantage on the learning curve. Smart Beginnings places one adult with one child for a one-on-one reading/literacy hour on a weekly basis. The goal is to build a love of books, reading and learning new things as well as building vocabulary. Several members have now signed up to be part of this mentoring program.



The last order of business for this meeting was the announcement of the date set for the club's Charter Night on Saturday, April 16, 2016. By February 8 the club will have reached the requisite number of 20 members and will be eligible for full club status.


