A NOTE FROM THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR 24E

Membership

It appears the economy is having an impact on our efforts to increase our membership this year. We are doing better at retention than the other districts but we need to do better. The following is a recap District goals based on International President Brandel's areas of emphasis for this year.

Family Membership

While we are slightly down in this area, we have some new family units which should bring us back to even for the first three quarters of this Lions' Year.

Women Membership

Going into the last quarter of this Lions' Year, we have exceeded our goal to increase the number who are Lions in District 24-E.

Retention

Our retention efforts are seeing mixed results when you look at the raw statistics. However, when the numbers are put together, we are achieving the District's goal for Retention. The goal for the year was to reduce the attrition rate by ½ of 1 percent. We are currently at .65 of 1 percent. While I had hoped for better results, the District will achieve this goal if we are vigilant in our Retention efforts.

Alternative Membership Status

Community Service

This is one of the areas that Lions International President Al Brandel has chosen as one of goals for this year. We really need to get out and initiate community service projects not only for this year but for the future as well.

Partnership

This not just a 10 letter word when you actively involve others in our Lions' projects and programs. It is a means of first having more manpower to achieve the needs of our local community and second a source of new members. The best recruitment tool is to get people involved in what we do and they will want to become a member.

Identify Community Needs

Lions Clubs International Foundation

LCIF District Coordinators

Starting this year, LCIF is starting a new program which will use District Coordinators to advance the goals and objectives of this vital program. The individuals chosen to serve in this role will have to commit to four years to ensure their maximum value to LCIF.

Fund Raising

This is a very important aspect of the program goals and objectives. It will take the input of all of the Lions in our District to maximize the potential of the goals and needs of people in our communities, state and our international community.

Grants

Many Lions believe that we are the supply side of the Foundation; however, over the last number of years, we receive more funds by way of grants than donation we make to LCIF. This is only to say that LCIF looks first to the needs of the International Community and not to the location that has the need.

Children's Programs

Lions Quest

Lion Dallas Scott has completed a second round of applying for a Virginia Tobacco Settlement Foundation Grant (VTSF.) We are current in the posture of waiting to find out if we will receive funding for our proposal this year for the schools in Bedford County.

As many of you know, we were unsuccessful in our initial bid to win a VTSF grant. This Lion Dallas and I saw as a challenge to work harder to achieve this goal for the District.

Peace Poster Contest

It is not too early to start planning for next fall. When the students have all summer to work on their posters, the results is awesome. Please consider starting prior to the time school closes for the summer.

Bland Music Festival

Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer Lion JJ has done an outstanding job on this program. There are two very important dates coming up. The first one is our District Bland Festival finals on April 19th at 2:30 PM. It will take place at the Cave Springs United Methodist Church. Please invite your friends to accompany you to the District Contest. Many of these young adults have never performed for a large crowd. A large crowd will help them prepare for the great audience that we have at the State Contest.

Election of Officers and PU-101s

For the new Secretaries to fulfill their duties, they must have a LCI password to get into the file to post monthly reports. For written reports they have to be in by the 20th of each month. When they are electronic, you have until the 30th.

Just as you may have looked to the sitting club officers for advice before you took office, the incoming members of the leadership team may look to you for advice. If asked, brief them regarding the status of the club, and any other pertinent information. The transfer of club records to the next leadership team is necessary and important.

You not only represent your club, but also the district and association as you work with club members and the community throughout the year. Your term as a club officer can be a rewarding experience, personally and professionally. Your efforts are highly valued and appreciated.

Dear Lion,

Lions Clubs International has had a long-lasting, and very rewarding partnership with the Special Olympics organization. The Special Olympics organization is engaging in a new campaign, launching March 31, called "Spread The Word to End The Word." It is a national day of awareness for America to stop and think about their use of the R-word. That R-word is not "recession," but something more hurtful and painful – "retard."

Camp Too Sweet

Camp Too Sweet which is a cooperative effort between Carilion Clinic and the Lions of District 24-E will be held at Camp Roanoke June 22-26 for young people between the ages of 7 and 16 who have type 1 or type 2 diabetes.

Lions involvement will include providing notaries on the opening morning (June 22), a teacher for Lions Quest training, hearing screening, and vision screening. We will also secure day and night deputy sheriffs for camp security, provide Lion's coloring books for the younger campers, and purchase Camp Too Sweet tee shirts with the Lion's logo and "Lions District 24-E" on them for campers as well as Carilion staff, Camp Roanoke staff, and volunteers who help with camp.

The cost for day campers will be \$200 each; and the cost for resident campers will be \$325 each. We hope to have as many as 50 campers this year from many parts of Virginia as well as from some other states. Scholarship applications are already being received, and the number of scholarship needs will certainly exceed what we have had in the past. We need for all of the Lions Clubs in District 24-E to participate in providing financial assistance and volunteer help for our camp this year. As usual the Lions of District 24-E will pay for the scholarship needs for all campers from our district. Any campers with scholarship needs from outside District 24-E will have their scholarships paid by the Lions District which contains their home address.

I would like to thank all of our Lions Clubs in District 24-E who have supported Camp Too Sweet in the past through financial and/or volunteer efforts. Without our Lions Clubs' participation, we could not be able to help the young people who need our assistance to be able to participate in such an activity and educationally focused learning experience.

I would also like to thank Carilion Clinic for their formation of Camp Too Sweet and for their dedication to providing 24/7 on site nursing and physician care and diabetes awareness and management education.

Last but certainly not least I would like to thank the sheriff's departments of Bedford, Franklin, and Roanoke Counties which have provided night and day deputies and/or resource officers.





Leo Program History

In 1957, Coach Jim Graver started the Leo ball rolling. Chances are, that ball was a baseball.

Graver was the coach of the Abington High School, Pennsylvania, USA, baseball team. Graver was also an active member of the Glenside, Pennsylvania, Lions Club.

With fellow Lion, William Ernst, Graver talked about starting a service club for high school boys. So they asked their fellow Lions for support. Without hesitation, the Glenside Lions agreed that a Lions youth group was a good idea. Graver and Ernst set to work.

On December 5, 1957, the Glenside Lions presented a charter to the Abington High School Leo Club whose members were mostly made up of the high school's baseball team.

As the world's first Leo club, the group created the Leo acronym - Leadership, Equality, Opportunity (Equality was later changed to Experience.) And, the group chose maroon and gold - their school colors - to serve as the Leo club colors.

Leo Club's Objective and Motto

In October 1967, the board of directors of Lions Clubs International adopted the Leo Club Program as an official program of the association. Open to males and females, the objective of the Leo Club Program was (and still is):

"...to provide the youth of the world (with) an opportunity for development and contribution, individually and collectively, as responsible members of the local, national and international community."

The Leo club motto is:

Leadership - Leos develop skills as organizers, time managers and motivators of their peers.

Experience - Leos learn the importance of cooperation through community service.

Opportunity - Membership provides young people with a chance to excel, to develop positive character traits, and to receive recognition for their contributions to the community.

Today, the Leo Club Program is stronger than ever. Community service remains the cornerstone of the program. Like their Lion counterparts, Leo club members enjoy serving their neighbors and watching positive results unfold.
