

SPECIAL NEEDS NEWS

Near the end of April we were contacted by Angela Ellis on behalf of her 15 year old son, Corey Hughes. Corey was born with a rare form of cancer, retinoblastoma. As a result he lost his left eye as an infant. He has had a prosthesis since that time. The prosthesis must be replaced from time to time as Corey has grown. At 15 years old his face is now maturing into that of an adult male. The prosthesis no longer fit and was causing problems. It needed to be replaced. Complicating things was the fact that Corey is allergic to the coating used on most prosthetic eyes and he and his mother have to travel to Philadelphia to have a specially coated prosthesis made. The cost of the new one was going to be \$3240. Angela had been on medical leave from her job since January and she needed help.

After receiving the Special Needs Request form and getting information from the doctors in Philadelphia the District 24E Charity approved \$1000 from the Special Needs fund to assist with the cost of Corey's new prosthesis. Through Governor Jim's contacts within LOVF we were able to apply for a grant after the closing date for requests to be screened at the State Convention in Tysons Corners on Friday, May 15. LOVF granted us the balance of the cost of Corey's new prosthesis and the two checks, totaling \$3240, were sent to the doctors in Philadelphia.

Vinton Breakfast Lions Club secretary, Hal Mabe, heard what we were trying to do for Corey and got on his phone. He messaged members of his club as well as the other Vinton Lions Clubs and within about 20 minutes they had come up with \$500 to send Angela and Corey toward their travel expenses. On Wednesday, May 20 Angela and Corey traveled to Philadelphia where he was fitted with his new prosthesis. Lions working together at the local, District and State level to live our motto, We Serve.

During the 2014/2015 year Special Needs has provided assistance to three individuals. The dollars in the Special Needs fund are diminishing as we help our neighbors in need. We have not received any donations to replace the funds we've used this year. Please, if your club or any individual either in your club or outside your club would like to make a contribution to the Special Needs Fund please do so. Your contribution, made payable to the District 24 E Charity, Inc. is tax deductable. We need your help so that we can continue our work helping others in need.

Over the weekend of May 15-17 Giles Breakfast Lions members Charlie and Betty Herbert attended the Lions of Virginia State Convention in Tysons Corners, VA. Both Lion Charlie and Lion Betty were honored to receive the 2015 Lions Script Pin from Governor Jim.





On the same weekend other members of Giles Breakfast Lions Club were busy with a blood drive sponsored for Virginia Blood Services during the opening day of the Pearisburg Farmers Market. During the course of the day the Blood Service's goal of 20 units of blood was exceeded when 26 units were collected. Every unit of blood collected by Virginia Blood Services at Giles County blood drives stays within the Carilion Clinic system either at the Giles Community Hospital or Carilion NRV. The day's collection of 26 units of blood means that a total of 78 lives were touched and perhaps some saved thanks to the donation so folks in Giles County. Another drive is scheduled for Saturday, June 20 at Pearisburg's Festival in the Park. The club hopes to be equally successful with this upcoming blood drive.

The 2015 Community Garden has been planted. Our partners, Christ Episcopal Church in Pearisburg, were kind enough to allow the garden to be expanded this year. This year's garden includes potatoes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, green beans, carrots, bell peppers, zucchini, yellow squash, acorn squash, butternut squash, eggplant, cabbage, broccoli, kale, collards, lettuce, spinach and basil. Vegetables will be distributed to the Health Dept. for the young mothers in their WIC program, the Giles Christian Mission's food bank, the Free Clinic, Giles Dept. of Social Services and the Giles Senior Center. Excess will be sold at the Pearisburg Farmers Market and the proceeds will go back into next summer's garden. Christ Episcopal Church will be constructing a garden shed for storage of our hoses during the summer as well as over winter with the trellis materials, stakes and tools. On June 12 they will be offering a Community Garden Kick-Off Picnic open to anyone in the community who wishes to attend. The church will provide hot dogs and hamburgers. The rest will be pot luck provided by the members of the church and Giles Breakfast Lions members.

Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club






