



Giles Breakfast Lions Club


Members of Giles Breakfast Lions Club were active serving Giles County during September and October.




Smith Mountain Lake Lions Club

Eighty seven children and 7 adults were screened with 9 children and 4 adults referred for follow-up evaluation. The club has purchased and anxiously awaits the delivery of a SPOT machine so that we may expand our screening efforts.

We ended the month on Halloween with a hugely successful food drive held at the Forest Kroger. Working from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM the club collected 611 pounds of food and \$156 for our local area food bank. The 611 lbs of food was an all time one day record for the club.



Other highlights included a Saturday clean-up of Bateman Bridge Road leading to Jefferson's Poplar Forest and a Membership Drive and Broom Sale at the Forest Farmers Market on the day of the Health Screening.

The assignment was to meet and chat with the students during their lunch period. Members of the club engaged the students in conversations about their interests and encouraged them to showcase their skills. Lions Mary Ann & Cliff DeMars took gifts bags for the 18 students in the class. The gift bags, which included a tube of tooth paste and a tooth brush, were placed on the students' desks while they were out of the classroom. The students were elated to find the gifts on their desks when they returned.

Lions Mary Ann DeMars, Cliff DeMars, Mary Jo Hubble, Ernie Hubble, Jim Dalton, Wanda Dalton and Barbara Pendergrass Richmond enjoyed this project so much that they unanimously agreed to adopt Ms. Sweet's class as one of RVBLC's monthly projects for the year. When the group returned on October 15, they were pleasantly surprised to learn that the students were eager for them to return. Lion Wanda Dalton's comment captures the sentiment of all of the Lions involved in this project "I would like to take all of them home with me."

PCC Cliff and Lion Mary Ann DeMars do not miss an opportunity to serve. Contemplating Lion Cliff's annual cancer check-up at Mayo Clinic, Rochester, MN, in August and some vacation time too, they also wanted to do a service project.

After some research they were touched when they read about the extreme poverty of the Lakota people on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, South Dakota. The poverty on Pine Ridge can be described in no other terms than, Third World. It is common to find homes over crowded, as those with homes take in whoever needs a roof over their heads. Many homes are without running water, and without power. More than 800 families are served through the Jesuit pastoral ministry in partnership with the Lakota people on the Pine Ridge Indian



Reservation. Lions Cliff and Mary Ann chose the Red Cloud Indian School on the reservation, K-12, 400 students and their families for this service project. The members of the Roanoke Valley Breakfast Lions Club gave a roaring response when the project was presented to them. The response from their club spurred the DeMars to present the opportunity to their Berean Sunday School Class, Blue Eagle Credit Union, family and friends to come on board.

The response was over whelming - school supplies, baby supplies (clothing, blankets and diapers), hats, gloves, etc. were donated plus over \$2,000 in monetary donations. What a shopping spree ensued! Some of the purchases included, one hundred flashlights and extra batteries for each, 50 bath towels, 325 wash cloths, and way too many other items to list! Seventy pairs of new children and adult shoes (\$2.50 each) were purchased at the Roanoke Rescue Mission Thrift Store. In addition, the Rescue Mission donated 3 large boxes of toiletries and 110 plastic coat hangers.

Their goal was to fill one van with supplies. By the time they were ready to leave, they had two vans filled to capacity and wonderful church friends Duane and Ann Williams volunteering to bring the extra load.



Lions Cliff and Mary Ann want to express their gratitude for all who made this mission possible. They wish for the words to convey to you the expressions of gratitude they saw in the faces of those on the staff, and the workers that helped to unload the vans.

It is said, "A picture is worth a thousand words." Lion Cliff,

asked a Lakota woman to try on a pair of shoes for a photo and told her, "If they fit, you may have them." The shoes were a fit and she walked away with the box under her arm and a smile on her face.


